Thanks to your unwavering dedication, the Foundations at Health Sciences North (HSN) have achieved a record-breaking year for fundraising, with **\$21 million** raised to support excellence in patient care.

Health Sciences North Foundation, NEO Kids Foundation, Northern Cancer Foundation, HSN Volunteer Association, and Volunteer Services are honoured to collaborate in ensuring that your generosity makes a profound impact in the lives of the more than 600,000 people across our region relying on specialized care at HSN.

Your support serves as a vital link, connecting patients to exemplary care and helping to pioneer research aimed at enhancing health outcomes in the Northeast and beyond. It empowers the HSN team to deliver timely, high-quality care using cutting-edge medical equipment and the latest treatment options.

Over the past year, the Foundations invested \$3.7 million directly into patient areas at HSN. This includes successfully funding the construction and equipment costs of a new 52-bed Acute and Reactivation Care Centre. \$2.3 million of this total was generously donated by the HSN Volunteer Association, sourced from proceeds from the HSN 50/50 Cash Lottery for the North.

Our Foundations have further invested in the future of care so that we can build and expand spaces to meet the needs of our community. To date, \$35.5 million has been designated towards future capital projects. These investments aim to strengthen the future of pediatric care, mental health services, and acute patient care, specifically benefiting vulnerable populations such as seniors, children, and individuals facing mental health and addiction challenges.

Our investment in research is driving innovation and breakthroughs in areas across cancer care, cardiac health, mental health and addictions and many other areas critical to our region. This year, through funding various positions and projects, we have invested \$1.1 million in furthering research within our community.

We extend our deepest gratitude for your tireless efforts in advancing high-quality care for patients across Northeastern Ontario.



Oncologists Leading the Path to Patient-Centered Excellence

Excellence is reflected in the work taking place every day at the Shirley and Jim Fielding Northeast Cancer Centre, and as Dr. Nathan Thangaroopan and Dr. Luisa Bonilla say, our community plays an essential role in driving the excellence of our Cancer Centre to reach new limits.



Dr. Nathan Thangaroopan joined the Shirley and Jim Fielding Northeast Cancer Centre team as a Radiation Oncologist in 2021 and has already seen exceptional growth in the outcomes of cancer patients.

"In the three years I've been with the Shirley and Jim Fielding Northeast Cancer Centre team, we have made incredible accomplishments to the level of care provided. Innovation and new technology have allowed us to significantly reduce the number of radiation treatments required for patients with breast or prostate cancer without compromising their treatment outcomes, having, in select cases, reduced radiation treatment **from 38 sessions down to 5 sessions.** These accomplishments are made possible because of the generosity of our donor community who believes in our work at the Shirley and Jim Fielding Northeast Cancer Centre."



Dr. Luisa Bonilla, a Medical Oncologist, believes that the Shirley and Jim Fielding Northeast Cancer Centre is more than a medical facility. It's a place of hope for breakthroughs in cancer care for Northeastern Ontario patients and families.

"Worldwide, cancer is considered a pandemic, and that is the reality in our community too. Cancer understanding and treatments are constantly evolving, and we are developing new options for effective treatments. It is important for our community to be involved in our mission to provide the best cancer care. It ensures we can continue to improve outcomes through research and innovation to be that much closer to a future without cancer."

Caring for Patients Where and When They Need it Most



Traveling to HSN for Specialized Care

Mary and Jeff live in Parry Sound but have frequently travelled to Sudbury to receive specialized care throughout their lives.

Mary was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2004, which reoccurred in 2018. Both times, she was glad to be surrounded by the compassionate team at the Shirley and Jim Fielding Northeast Cancer Centre at HSN, who helped her through her treatment. Understanding that Mary was from out of town, her oncologist and health team worked with her local hospital and OTN to ensure she was getting the care she needed, where she needed it.

Jeff had a heart attack in 2017 and was rushed from Parry Sound to HSN to receive specialized cardiac care. During this scary time, Mary and Jeff found comfort as they learned about HSN's history of excellence in cardiac care. Jeff was in the hospital for nearly two weeks, recovering from a life-saving bypass surgery, and Mary made numerous trips from Parry Sound to HSN, much closer than driving to Southern Ontario.

Both Mary and Jeff are grateful for the care they received at HSN and hope that, through the generosity of our community, HSN can continue to be an exceptional leader in cardiac and cancer care for Northeastern Ontario residents.

Donor-Funded OMNI Beds Save Lives in the NICU

After his mother Katie's diagnosis with a rare pregnancy complication, while 30 weeks pregnant, Theo arrived nearly 10 weeks early via emergency C-section at HSN.

Being born prematurely and weighing only 2lbs 10oz meant Theo required extra care in the NICU. His breathing was unstable which required multiple interventions and numerous hours spent in an OMNI Bed receiving care. After six long weeks in the NICU, he was finally able to go home with his family for the first time.

"I am thankful for all of the doctors, nurses and staff who have supported my son, husband, and I - and continue to support us. I don't know where we would be without NEO Kids!" said Katie.

One Million Reasons to be Thankful – United Steelworkers (USW) Local 6500 Surpasses \$1 Million in Lifetime Giving

Since their first gift in 1988 to their most recent gift of \$50,000 earlier this year, the USW Local 6500 has surpassed a remarkable milestone of \$1 million donated to enhance patient care through the Foundations at HSN.

One of USW Local 6500's key contributions over the years was a \$500,000 donation towards the construction of the Children's Treatment Centre, which officially opened in 2010. Further, their support extended to the funding of various equipment across HSN, including two new ventilators for the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit and HSN's PET scanner, one of only thirteen in Ontario, which allows Northeastern Ontario patients to stay closer to home for this type of advanced medical imaging.

"HSN's services have touched our lives in many ways," said Nick Larochelle, President of USW Local 6500. "We feel strongly about giving back to causes meaningful to our members, and this has included pediatric care, oncology, research, and everything in between.

Here are a Few Ways You're Making a Difference



DIALYSIS CHAIRS – Dialysis patients can now experience greater comfort during their treatments thanks to new, donor-funded chairs. With dialysis typically lasting four hours, three times a week, the increased comfort will make a significant difference in their treatment experience.

CARDIAC ULTRASOUNDS –

Community support has helped fund the replacement of two cardiovascular ultrasound systems (ECHOs) for HSN. Set to arrive in 2024, the ECHOs are critical to diagnosing, planning treatments, monitoring, and providing follow-up care for thousands of patients across all areas of HSN, including oncology and pediatrics.



DEEP RESOLVE MRI 3T TECHNOLOGY INTEGRATION – Deep

Resolve is an advanced image reconstruction technology that can take a blurry MRI picture and make it clearer. Pediatric patients, in particular, will benefit from this technology integration because children have difficulty remaining still for long periods of time. In the past, they sometimes required multiple MRI scans or sedation to generate a clear image. This new technology means that our patients can be scanned faster and have a more comfortable experience.




Enhanced Seniors Care Made Possible by HSN 50/50 Supporters

The number of older adults living with frailty in Northeastern Ontario is growing rapidly, and so is the need to deliver them specialized care. In November 2023, the Acute and Rehabilitation Care Centre (ARCC) was opened at HSN. This 52-bed facility was purposefully designed to deliver precise care for older adults by a clinical team with specialized expertise.

Total capital costs for the project are \$11.9 million, including \$2.3 million coming from the HSN Volunteer Association through the HSN 50/50. This funding covers 10% of construction expenses and all equipment within the ARCC.

Patients at the ARCC are provided with recreational and rehabilitative care activities and have access to a full team of nurses and allied health professionals with specialized training throughout their stay. The facility includes amenities such as a gym, communal dining area, and courtyard, all aimed at promoting recovery and preserving independence and quality of life. By focusing on providing the best care possible to patients in the ARCC, patients spend, on average, eight days less in the hospital and transition to home or the community sooner with decreased chances of requiring long-term care.





HSN Research Institute Home to Some of the Brightest Minds in Research




Researcher: Dr. Cahill Funding Awarded: \$30,000

Dr. Cahill's research focuses on the patient experience and surgical outcomes of colorectal surgery patients who use a specified diet to facilitate weight loss in the weeks before surgery.



Researcher: Dr. Le **Funding Awarded:** \$35,000

Dr. Le's group is looking to develop new innovative therapies that stimulate the immune system in cancer patients to eradicate the cancer and reduce the side effects during treatment.



Researcher: Dr. Parissenti Funding Awarded: \$35,000

Dr. Parissenti's research focuses on how chemotherapy agents induce responses in tumour cells (such as RNA degradation) and how responses can be used to predict patient outcomes and tailor patient care.



Researcher: Dr. Pearce **Funding Awarded:** \$30,000

Dr. Pearce is working towards identifying genetic factors that would help predict the severity of radiation treatment side effects to the throat to decreasing side effects experienced by future patients.

Donor-Funded Research Chairs Enhancing Care

In 2023, HSNRI appointed a third distinguished research chair, Dr. Mohammed Shurrab, whose role is supported by HSN Foundation. The two existing chairs, Dr. David Marsh and Dr. Stacey Santi, continued their dedicated work in conducting research to improve health outcomes for people across Northeastern Ontario.



Dr. David Marsh

Health Sciences North Foundation Research Chair in Mental Health and Addictions

Dr. Marsh continues to make progress toward developing a research program with diverse areas of expertise and lived experience. By bringing a range of perspectives to the challenges posed by substance use, he hopes to identify innovative solutions and clear opportunities for improvement in the existing system of care for mental health and addictions patients.



Researcher: Dr. Pitre Funding Awarded: \$25,000

Dr. Pitre and her team are advancing the use of clinical trials and expanding the availability of clinical trials in Northeastern Ontario communities.



Researcher: Dr. Saunders Funding Awarded: \$35,000

Dr. Saunders' research explores long-term treatment outcomes and genetic variations in head and neck cancer patients who smoke.



Researcher: Dr. Tharmalingam Funding Awarded: \$40,000

Dr. Tharmalingam is rewiring the genetic code to alter breast cancer clinical outcomes and prevent a resurgence of secondary cancers.



Researcher: Dr. Thome Funding Awarded: \$40,000

Dr. Thome is using genetically modified microbes to combat side effects and improve the quality of life for patients following radiation therapy.



Dr. Stacey Santi Northern Cancer Foundation Research Chair in Cancer Solutions

In addition to supporting various researchers and their projects within the Cancer Solutions team, Dr. Santi continues her work towards assessing the burden of cancer-related costs for Northern Ontario patients. This research aims to address disparities between Northern and Southern Ontario residents around access to and impacts of cancer care.



Dr. Mohammed Shurrab Health Sciences North Foundation Research Chair in Cardiovascular Health


This role enables Dr. Shurrab to dedicate time to his critical research, focusing on quality improvement and delivering evidence-based care to patients at HSN, helping to improve patient outcomes. Further to this, he is investigating healthcare disparities between cardiac patients in Northern and Southern Ontario and aims to reduce barriers to care.






